PROJECT: Ka 'Ai A Kanaloa – Marine Monitoring	STATUS: 1st Day: Ocean was calm for the ka'apuni half-way around the island from Lae Halona to Kamohio around Puu Koa'e to Waikahalulu, Puhi Anenue and to Honokanai'a. However, there was a lot of white water and strong waves and surges on the ledges at all the points due to the south swell. At Honokanai'a by 10:30am there were huge sets due to the south swell and the landing of the canoes, people, ukana and the zodiacs had to be perfectly timed. Once landed, we set up the kitchen under the kiawe tree by the picnic tables and placed the canoes by the puu with the kiawe tree. Soon after, huge sets during the sets inundated the akiaki grass areas across the beach, the kitchen area and lifted the canoes. There was a strong backwash to each of the waves. The		



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	<p>waves continued to build in size through the afternoon high tide and even into the evening. 2nd Day: Some breeze, sets were still huge in Honokanai‘a, below the deck in camp and out to Honukanae, to Puu O Tahiti and Kealaikahiki. Two monk seals were resting at Puu O Tahiti, one gray and the other black. One was tagged. 3rd Day : Regular trade winds returned, size & intensity of wave sets started to subside, but King Tide brought waves high on shore, but not all the way to the vegetation line. 4th Day: Ocean was calm, breezes were light for the ka‘apuni from Honokanai‘a to Honokoa and up the coast to Ahupū, Kuheia and Ku‘iku‘i. Channel crossing was very calm. Saw a pod of about 50 nai‘a off of Kaukaupapa</p>

Concentrations of bullets and shrapnel at a lookout area with a view toward Sailor’s Hat and again at a bluff looking out toward Puhī Anenue and Hawai‘i Island.</p>

Mahalo for turning on the ice machine, as this kept us inspired in the heat of the days' work. • Mahalo to KIRC for allowing the group to set up our kitchen at the decks along the shore and to sleep on the decks in camp when it was not possible to camp on the beach due to the inundation by waves because of the south swell • For next year, would hopefully be able to time our stay, if at Honokanai'a, where we could have access to water and vehicles to be able to visit Moa'uaiki and Naulu. • There were a few patches of green on 'Ale'ale, one was mai'a pilo, not sure what the other patches might be. • Can still make out an old road from Sailor's Hat to Puhi Anenue, so the continued opening of the Ala Loa between those 2 points will be relatively simple

DAY 1	Ka'apuni from Halona, Kaka, Kamohio, Pu'u Koa'e, Waikahalulu, Puhi Anenue to Honokanai'a. Landed at Honokanai'a. After inundation of beach camp, moved to decks in the KIRC camp.
Day 2	Honokanai'a to Kealaikahiki: did weed whacking and lining of the trail from Honokanai'a to Kealaikahiki and back. 'Awa ceremony at Kealaikahiki.
Day 3	Sailor's Hat toward Puhi Anenue: Flagged 2.1 miles and weedwhacked and lined .8 mile from Sailor's Hat to Puhi Anenue.



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Day 4	Ka'apuni from Honokanai'a to Honokoa and up to Ahupu, Kuheia, and Ku'iku'i. 'Ohana zodiac returned 3 weedwhackers and gas to Hakioawa since ocean was so calm. Crossing the channel for canoes, boats and zodiacs went smoothly. Canoes landed at Makena. Boats and zodiacs returned to Kihei boat ramp.
